

How to collect a mid-stream urine (MSU) sample

Information for patients

This leaflet provides information about how to collect a mid-stream urine (MSU) sample. If you have any other questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to speak to your antenatal team.

Why do I need to provide a mid-stream urine sample?

At every antenatal contact you will be asked to provide a fresh mid-stream urine sample. We may also ask you to provide a sample if you are experiencing symptoms of a urinary tract infection.

Catching the sample mid-stream is important because it reduces contamination from skin or vaginal bacteria, giving a cleaner sample that more accurately reflects whether there is an infection in the bladder and helps avoid false results or unnecessary treatment.

You will be provided with a sample container or bag by your antenatal healthcare professional or the receptionist.

Steps to collect a mid-stream urine sample

- Wash and dry your hands.
- Open the container, being careful not to touch the inside of the container or cap.
- Hold open your vaginal opening.
- Wipe once from front to back using an unscented tissue or wipe.
- Start peeing into the toilet.
- After a second or two, without stopping, place the container in the stream to collect mid-stream urine.
- Finish peeing into the toilet.
- Tightly close the lid on the container and wipe the outside if needed.
- Put the container into the sample bag provided, close the bag and hand it to the clinician.
- Wash your hands with soap and warm water and dry them.
